In particular, the use of the computer in amateur radio can be of prime interest to club members. Logging, packet, call directories, mailing programs, data bases, spreadsheets, word processors can also be of interest. Hardware and software problems and solutions if known, or questions in search of solutions can be published. Since, my own experience is mostly with IBM types, I'll need support from others of you for other formats such as mentioned above. Naturally I'll need support in IBM types as well. I sure don't have a corner on answers. If sufficient interest does not develop, the column will die a natural death.

Everything in Amateur Radio



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So far I know of two recent computer nay-sayers who are now proud (?) and happy (?) computer owners. **Dan WS3M** and **Ron WB3DOM** now seem to be enjoying theirs. Dan has one or two Commodore 64's and Ron has an IBM type. Ron was going strong during the PA QSO party logging calls, counties and sections. (Yours truly did also.) We had a bug in the program, but expect to get it resolved before the next PA QSO party. It was written by K8CC; Jim, KJ3L is going to talk to him.

Seems the PA sections would not load under certain conditions. Ron and I both experienced the difficulty. It is shareware named PALOG for IBM. I used it in 1991 with no trouble, but when I tried to load it again in 1992, it burped: loaded only counties, not the ARRL sections. I was therefore unable to use it during logging, but did key in the calls later to get the dupes and reports. Still saved a lot of time.

Just for clarification, shareware is a term for programs distributed without charge, but which the program author *requests* a modest payment, usually from \$5 to \$30, if you find it of value. For some very complex systems I have seen larger amounts requested.

Conversely, freeware is distributed with no expectation of payment and is in public domain.

Many thousands of programs were offered free during the early PC days. They helped a lot of us do things we never could have done otherwise. A lot of very good programs are available in both methods of distribution.

Caveat: when you go to a hamfest or flea market, you will see tables with hundreds of disks at very low prices. I have found that a large majority of these disks are shareware and we are expected to send money if we use them. But in too many cases they contain only a sampling of the program and are useless unless you pay and register with the author, at which time they will send the real program! They are a disappointment if you don't realize this and expect a functional system. Nevertheless a good program can be well worth the modest cost in time saved and features it makes available.

Anyone who has done any amount of programming can appreciate the many hours it takes to write, debug and document a program which has any degree of complexity and value. So we want to comply with the shareware author's request and send payment, if we use the program regularly.....73,

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"REFLECTIONS, Transmissions Lines and Antennas"
by M. Walter Maxwell, W2DU

This relatively new book on the ARRL book shelf is a must read for people interested in understanding antenna theory and practice. Mr. Maxwell is a noted antenna designer with exceptional credentials. He attacks the many myths that abound in the amateur ranks concerning low SWR, resonate length antennas, loss of reflected power, and impedance matching. He also explains the use of the Smith chart, the function of a transmatch and the advantage of choke baluns over transformer baluns. His discussion of truly all band HF antennas should be of great value to anyone operating those frequencies. Although there is math included to prove his arguments there is also much valuable information in plain language.

Here are some of his comments on multiband HF antennas:

"I hope I've convinced you of the necessity for an antenna tuner, so why not use it to fullest advantage and achieve multiband HF operation with the simplest, yet effective and efficient antenna? I'm speaking of a random-length dipole fed with either open wire line or ladder line. By random length, I mean any length at least a 1/4 wave at the lowest frequency of operation."

"A center-fed 1/4 wave dipole radiates with an effectiveness of approximately 95% relative to a 1/2 wave dipole, and has a terminal impedance of approximately 14-j1300 ohm. This terminal impedance yields an SWR of 424 to 1 on 300 ohm line.....with the low loss characteristics.....the results are good. This is what I use for 160-meter operation, an 80-meter 1/2 wave dipole, which is 1/4 wave on 160 and fed with 300 ohm line. It works very well."

Wow, an SWR 424:1 and it it works very well! Better read the book. After reading this section and Walt's comments on the G5RV, I modified mine into a similar dipole to the one described above. I use a tuner, a short run of RG8 to get out of the house, an old Heath kit Balun, a random length of 450 ohm ladder line, to a 92 foot dipole. Longer is better but shorter will work too. The balun is not required if you can bring the ladder line to a tuner with a parallel output. The feed line should come away from the dipole at 90 degrees for some distance before making turns and should not be run close to metal rain gutters, siding, etc. The legs of the dipole must be equal in length.

To quote my teacher "It works very well" on all frequencies for the old 5 bands 80 through 10. I do not have the WARC bands. Don't miss the very interesting chapter on choke baluns which can be used on coax fed antennas as well. The W2DU non-transformer choke balun is listed in the A.E.S. catalog under Unadilla (W2AU). The Van Gorden all-band dipole is also listed.

Shortwave listening? Why not! While SWLing may not be a part of amateur radio, there's no denying the very close relationship between the two hobbies. While CBing may have usurped SWLing as the main gateway to ham radio, thousands still get their first taste of hobby radio by listening to the international shortwave giants on a portable radio. In any event, it's a well-known fact that many hams are closet SWLs. As a matter of fact, more than one prominent DXer has been known to guard his top shortwave QSLs as jealously as many of his most-prized ham pasteboards.

So, whether the closest you get to shortwave listening is fighting the BBC World Service on 40, or if you regularly scan 41, 19, and 13 meters more often than 40, 20, and 15, the world of SWLing is something we should all know a little more about.

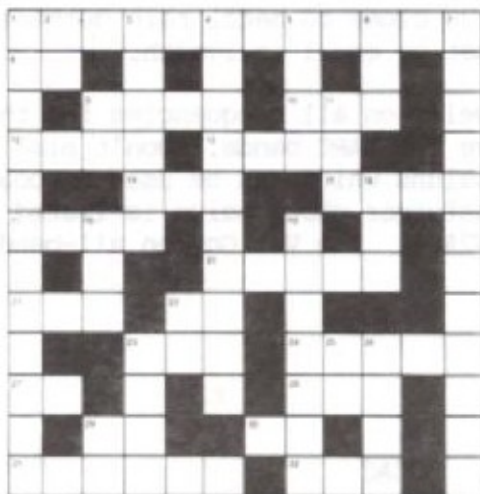

Element 4:

- 1) True—In a series of experimental transmissions during November, 1980. More SSTV broadcasts may take place this year.

- 4) False—They're commercial stations transmitting business or safety traffic.
- 5) True—Radio energy from the giant planet can be detected at those frequencies with the proper receiving gear.
- 6) True—Ironic, isn't it?
- 7) False—East Berlin.
- 8) False—Like most international broadcasters, the VOA transmits in dozens of languages.
- 9) True—25.600–26.100 MHz. Just below you-know-what.
