***** RAE MINUTES *****
March 4, 1971

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 PM by president K3UPC.

Officers present: K3UPC, K3VXE, WA3MAU, WA3KAI.

Directors present: WA3HDK, W3KPM, W3SN.

The February minutes were approved as read.

The Treasurers report, indicating a new balance of \$336.29, was also approved.

CORRESPONDENCE - The following was introduced by K3VXE.

- (1) Several more QSLs received from past RAE county expeditions.
- (2) Several newsletters were also received from other radio clubs.
- (3) Bill from Caravaglia Printing for printing supplies.
- (4) Notice from Addressograph on status of balance in prepaid account.
- (5) Bill from Warren Radio for relay for the RAE Repeater.

ACTIVITIES - K3VXE reported on the following activities.

- (1) March 6-7, ARRL DX Phone Contest - RAE is to participate again.
- (2) March 25, Facsimile talk given by K3VXE and W3ZLO possibly at the Naval Reserve Center.
- (3) April ?, engineer from Astatic Corp. to discuss microphones. More on this later.
- (4) April 17, combined RAE and LSARC auction at St. George Auditorium.
- (5) May ?, attempting to secure another out-of-town speaker.

K3VXE reminded everyone of WA3HSR and W3KT's photograph shown in March QST, page 85. Ron also reminded members that W3SN is now the new trustee of the club station license (W3GV) and instructed the treasurer to reimburse W3SN the required modification fee of \$9.00. The secretary was also requested to send for the ARRL Annual Report as described in the March issue of QST.

COMMITTEES - WA3HSR reported that the up-to-date membership listing shown in the March QUA-RAE totals 105 members. The usual 200 copies of the QUA-RAE plus complimentary and exchanges were also mailed last Monday.

There was no Hamfest report from K3VLP who was not present.

WA3GIV was also not present could not report on CD equipment, however, K3VXE who did check reported that all equipment is in fine shape.

W3KPM reported that he and Dave Parmenter were out to the EOC for inspection after the DX Contest. Tom and Mr. Parmenter were both disappointed at the RAE membership and requested the EOC to be cleaned up properly after this coming weekend's contest. Tom had nothing to report on RACES.

WA3HSR, who recently discussed the AREC with (SEC), W3KPJ, introduced applications for AREC participation on behalf of W3KPJ.

W3ZLO reported that the RAE Repeater is without an ID, however this is to be corrected shortly. Also, the repeater is now being prepared for permanent mounting on the Police Tower as soon as the weather allows. Chuck introduced the group present from

Ashtabula, Ohio who will discuss repeater problems with the RAE repeater group immediately after the business meeting.

WA3HDK advised that the 1971 Auction will be held at St. George Auditorium on Saturday, April 17, from 4:00PM to 10:00 PM. WA3HSR talked with W3ALD of LSARC, who are to combine with thw RAE on this years auction advising him of plans thus far. K3UPC will be the auctioneer, and Mr. McGary will be his assistant.

Under Old Business, WA3HSR introduces samples of stationery made by the RNS Printing Shop and reported on the styles, colors and prices for both letterheads and envelopes.

WA3HDK advised that Penelec will not be available in the future to all organizations, due to security measures now employed at this facility. Bob also spoke to personnel at the Naval Reserve Center on their available facilities.

Under New Business, K3VXE made a motion that "The RAE purchase 1000 letterheads and envelopes from RNS Printing at the prices quoted." W3ZLO seconded this motion, which was voted on and carried.

WA3HDK requested the QUA-RAE staff put the Naval Reserve Center on the mailing list. Bob also advised that Capt. Allison of the NRC would like assistance on their communications equipment and that he would contact the RAE in the near future on this.

WA3HDK introduced a letter and questionnaire from the Atlantic Division Director of ARRL, Harry McConaghy. Most ARRL members received theirs, however, still a few did not get their copy due to third class mailing.

K3VXE introduced a letter from Harry McConaghy advising the RAE to make their selection for the Atlantic Division Assistant Director. Ron made a motion opening nominations for assistant director, seconded by WA3HSR, voted on and carried. WA3HSR nominated W3ZLO, Chuck Smith, seconded by K3VXE. W3SN nominated WA3HSR, Mike Hall, seconded by WA3LSY. WA3HDK made a motion that nominations be closed, seconded by W3SN, voted on and carried. Upon secret ballot vote, the members selected W3ZLO as assistant director to ARRL Atl. Div. Director, Harry McConaghy. K3VXE is to inform W3EPC of this selection.

K3UPC advised he would check into the possibility of securing ARRL Bulletins on RTTY for membership information.

There were 14 members and 2 guests present for this meeting.

A motion for adjournment was made at 9:05 PM by W3KPM, seconded by W3SN voted on and carried.

NOTES FROM THE EMERGENCY COORDINATOR

Rules For Net Members

- Teamwork is the theme of net operation. The net which functions most efficiently is the net in which all the participants are thoroughly familiar with the procedure used and in which the operators refrain from transmitting except at the direction of the NCS. They do not waste time with extraneous comments.
- When a single member violates a single one of the net rules, circuit discipline deteriorates and the lost time and confusion increase geometrically with the number of operators who fail to observe the rules.
- Zero beat the net control carefully, without putting a signal on the air. Net is where the NCS is.
- Always get NCS's permission to transmit, even to transmit to him. In voice nets this is done by giving your own call sign once. NCS may acknowledge by repeating your call sign or by saying "go ahead."
- Transmit only to NCS when you do transmit, except on instructions from NCS to address another station. You may be tempted at times to jump in to help. Such "help," however, only adds difficulty and confusion. Wait until the NCS asks for your help.
- Answer promptly when NCS calls you. Pay attention to business.
- NEVER leave the net without telling NCS, even for a few moments. If you must leave temporarily or permanently, ask for NCS's permission.
- Stations which are sent off-frequency to handle traffic should return to net to be excused--not just close up shop after clearing the hook.

 *****PROPAGATION REPORT*****

Well fellow DXers, the present sunspot cycle has definitely begun to decline and we must, unfortunately, look forward to several years of declining propagation. The sunspot number has reached its lowest point since September of 1967 and it is expected to decrease more this year.

Fifteen meters should be the best band for DX during April from shortly after sunrise until the early evening hours. Exceptionally strong signal levels should occur during many of these openings and openings to the tropics and southern hemisphere should prevail well into the hours of darkness. Propagation conditions on twenty meters should be at optimum during hours of darkness and the sunrise period. The increased amount of daylight will cause the 20 meter band to remain open longer to most areas of the world. Highest signal levels should occur during the hours of darkness.

A definite decline in 10 meter openings should bring tears to the eyes of many DXers in Erie. This is the time of year during which this is typical. Openings are still expected to occur during daylight hours to the tropical areas. A decline of DX openings should follow on 160, 80 and 40 meters. The hours of darkness should bring some good openings to 40 meters to many areas of the world. The seasonal increase of thunderstorm activity in this hemisphere will be the cause for higher static levels on these bands.

April should be a good month with openings on the VHF bands. The seasonal increase in Sporadic-E propagation should begin this month. It will result in an increase in short-skip openings between distances of 750-1300 miles on 10 and 6 meters with possible multiple hop skip to 2400 miles. During the more intense periods of Sporadic-E ionization, 2 meters is also expected to open up over distances between 1200 and 1400 miles. Sporadic-E conditions usually peak in the late morning and early evening hours.

Lyrids, a major meteor shower should take place between April 21-23, peaking late in the afternoon on the 22nd. During this peak, 15 meteors per hour are expected to enter the atmosphere increasing the chances for a meteor scatter-type opening. An increase is also expected in the Trans-Equatorial Scatter between the northern and southern hemispheres. TE scatter is most likely between 8 and 11 PM.

As VHFers warm up the rigs and shin up the beams, HFers begin to think of bigger and better things next fall. Don't put the things away yet, though, as several weeks of good HF conditions are still forecast.

GET ON CHANNEL A — CHANNEL J IS COMING!

Detailed plans are now being made to complete and expand the W3ZLO repeater. Recently a 450 MHz. link was purchased to separate the 34 receiver from the 94 transmitter and to provide a 19 input until another link and site is procured for a 79 output.

Twenty interested members of the VHF Repeater Committee of the RAE recently met at the Red Cross building to begin plans for a definite goal and financial setup for the repeater complex. A committee was formed to study the necessary finances needed to maintain the repeater. Alex Dolgosh, K8EUR, licensee of the Ashtabula repeater was present to offer information and advice.

A meeting was also held with Barry Capell, WA3GSH, who holds the license for the WA3KUV repeater. This repeater, recently on 19-79 has been dismantled by Barry due to inactivity and numerous pointed remarks by members of the RAE and PARC. Barry wished to clear the record by saying that WA3KUV was his own repeater and despite publicity to the contrary had no support and/or connection wanted with the Presque Isle Amateur Radio Club. The W3ZLO repeater, with Barry and Bill Rothstein, K3WOL, contributing their welcome assistance will assume 19-79 which will give the repeater a base-station input on 19.

The 34-94 repeater has been plagued with RF feedback problems the last few weeks due to a problem in the transmitting antenna. It was found out the hard way that the VSWR has to be below 1.5 to 1 before a cavity will work in

a line to remove unwanted RF.

A.R.R.L. RESPONSE TO F.C.C. DOCKET ON REPEATER OPERATION

The ARRL has published a 60 page comment in response to the FCC Docket No. 18803, RM 388, RM 1087, RM 1209. The FCC docket and ARRL response will be briefly summarized here. Your own copy is obtainable from ARRL HQ or can be seen at any RAE meeting.

In a nutshell, the FCC docket called for:

1. The prohibition of repeater linking and multiple hops.
2. Mandatory coded access (whistle-on)
3. The prohibition of crossband repeater operation.
4. Repeater subbands : 146.30-146.60, input; 146.90-147.20, output. (2-M.)
5. The repeater licensee must continuously monitor the emissions at the control point.
6. That repeater input be limited to 600 watts.
7. Only Fixed repeaters would be provided for (no portable or mobile operations).
8. That a 3-minute time-out be mandatory.
9. Identification of the repeater at 3 minute intervals.
10. Relaxation of the logging requirements to include only repeater maintenance and time-on, time-off information.

The ARRL Board of Directors unanimously voted on this outline to be followed in the comment sheet:

1. That any rules adopted on Amateur repeaters provide for the maximum flexibility and the minimum of restrictions and regulations.
2. That repeater linking and multiple hops be permitted.

REPEATER DOCKET COMMENT, CONT.

3. That coded access (whistle on) not be mandatory but may be provided at the option of the repeater licensee.
4. That cross-band operation of repeaters be permitted.
5. That subbands for repeater operation not be specified by the Commission at this time except that, in the 144 MHz band, repeater operation be conducted only above 146 MHz so as to permit the greatest flexibility for development of space communications in the world-wide exclusively amateur portion of that band.
6. That the licensee or another operator with an appropriate class of license designated by the licensee be capable of deactivating the repeater from a fixed, portable, or mobile control point in case of malfunction or improper or unauthorized use of the repeater.
7. That the 1 Kilowatt power limit applicable generally to the amateur service be applicable to repeaters.
8. That fixed, portable and mobile operation of repeaters be permitted.
9. That automatic means to limit the length of a single transmission of a repeater, or a series of transmissions, not be required but may be provided at the option of the licensee.
10. That identification of a repeater be given at least every ten minutes of operation by automatic or manual means and by cw, mcw, or voice at the option of the licensee, with cw or mcw, if used, not to exceed a rate of 20 words per minute.
11. The League concurs with FCC's proposal regarding relaxation of logging requirements.

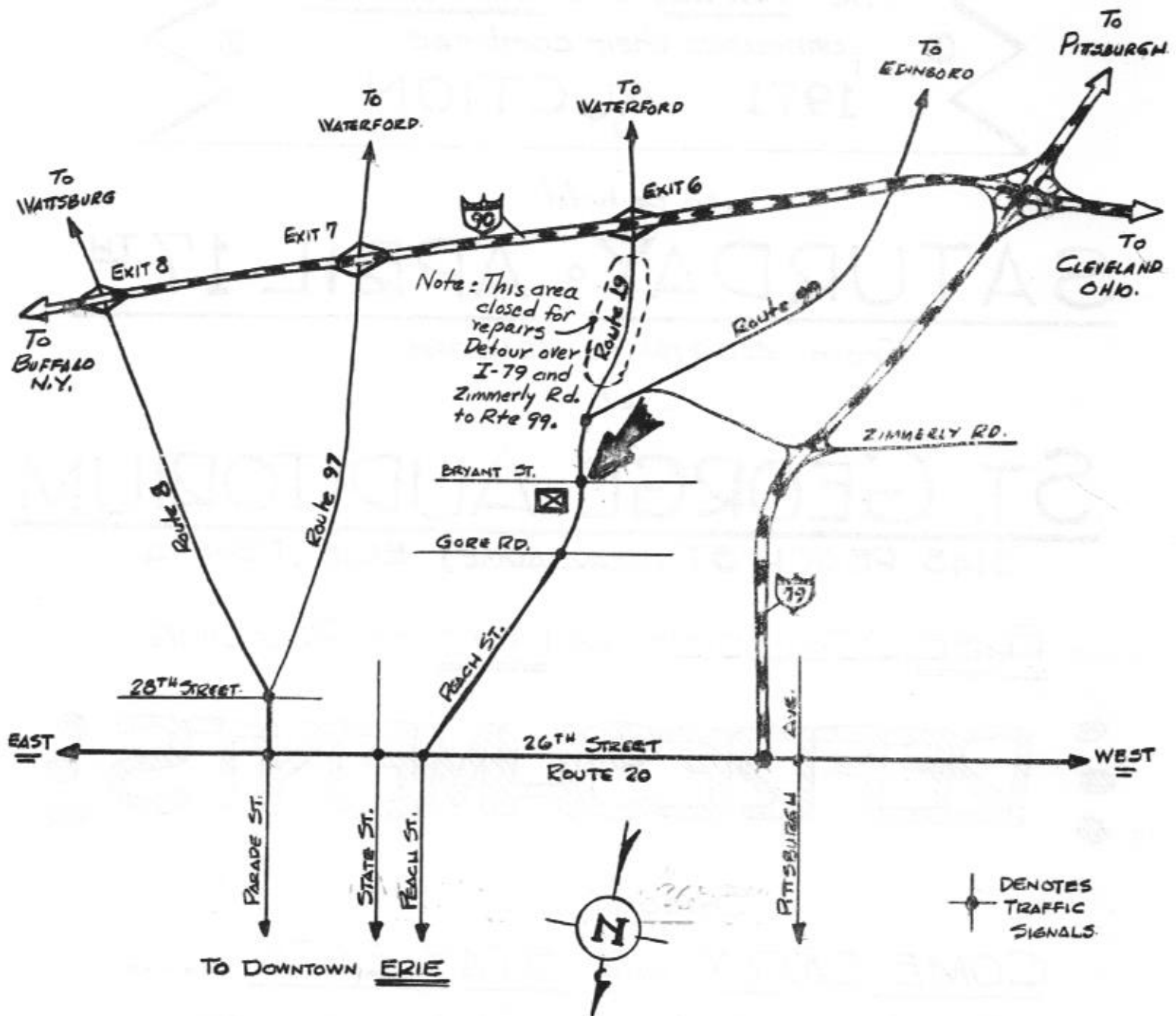
