THE SUMMER NEVER TO BE REPEATED ? DE W3ZLO

The summer of '71 will be well remembered by the users of the ZLO repeater. This summer marked one of the most active summers on VHF that Erie has seen. Beginning with Field Day, the repeater was the RAE's only link with Erie from the site. Even though it was not legal to obtain contacts through it, it was still fun talking to Cleveland, Buffalo, Brantford and Bradford (W3VV) along with WA2UWK and W2SB, all on .94. Running the repeater at 30 watts out and sporting a hot receiver hearing state line to state line, many mobiles traveling on I-90 were placed in motels by calling into the repeater and requesting the service.

A number of minor accidents were reported to the local Police and a young lad is alive today due to quick access to the telephone from the transmitter site. WA3AWB seems to have been gifted with the art of finding good news stories. Maybe Bing is in the wrong biz. It seems that one Saturday he was traveling along East 12th St. near the East Ave. bridge when he saw some youngsters looking at a boy laying on the Pavement. Quickly investigating, Bing found the child in need of quick medical attention, so he broke in on .34 requesting aid. ZLO called the ever ready Police department who in turn called Erie Ambulance by radio and dispatched a car to the scene. Before the ambulance arrived, Bing, a VietNam vet, saw the child beginning to lose his vital signs of life and convulsions began. Bing administered First Aid and sent someone to notify the boys parents who lived close to the accident scene. While passing motorists watched, Bing comforted the injured, failing child until ambulance attendants administered oxygen. Meanwhile on .94, W3ZLO, K8EUR, K8TVD, VE3ADO and others kept the frequency open until word was received from Bing that the child was on the way to the hospital. This time the repeater was worth its weight in Power and gold.

Early in the summer, we received some comments through the grapevine that the operators of the W2SB repeater in nearby Dunkirk, N.Y. were disturbed by the W3ZLO activities on .94 and were not too happy with us. An all out effort was made to clear up the gap between the border and begin a program discussed earlier of linking up Ashtabula, Erie and Dunkirk on a common input of .34. Stan, K2JQT, trustee of the W2SB repeater, was contacted by a personal visit and problems with repeaters and users were discussed. A visit was made to the repeater site, 807s were passed out and a deep discussion began that eventually brought the W2SB group, the K8EUR group and the W3ZLO group together in Erie for a tri-state meeting during the first week of August. This meeting was to bring us all together to iron out interference problems common to each of us and possible ways to overcome them. It was at this meeting that plans were laid to link up all three repeaters so one could begin a trip in Cleveland and travel to Buffalo without losing and contact with a station he is in QSO with.

During the month WA3GIV and W3ZLO made a quick Sunday afternoon visit to K8EUR to raise a 4-element tri-bander on the 160 foot tower. Light wind, Alex on the stick with GIV and ZLO grinding the rope into their hands and yanking it up the tower and soon the beam was majestically pointing somewhere on the globe. Next up was the new 450 corner reflector to grasp a signal from nearby Conneaut where the new receiver site was to be and maybe a feeble signal on 450 from Erie. Back home full of 807s and supper, we contacted K3WTZ and plans were made to test the path. The following week we acquired a 450 T44 crystalized up and set up the J-beam at the receiver site. The .34 receiver was moved to .76 to listen to K8EUR, the 450 was fired up and we waited for someone to come on EUR. But then the Law of Murphy took over. K8CQR, the Detroit repeater and others were stomping on .76. We found by the TI theory that we could slip into the insensitive K8EUR receiver good enough to get K8TVD and others to the "corn crib" (K8EUR repeater site). Over the air we heard that Gary's wife (K8EUR is on Gary's farm) had been hearing voices from the corn crib and the unattended Erie link receiver was the only thing with a speaker

on it. Alex arrived and confirmed it! We were there - - on 450 with only 10 watts going up the tower. But Murphy was still there and it was to take at least a week until the VHF band settled down before we were sure he didn't have his big toe in the works. W3ZLO and his overload of 807s returned home to the xmtr site after the .34 was again put on the link and punched up the .94 receiver. There they were - - KØs, K5s, K7s and VEs galore as all on .94. And down in the mud under the mess was WA3FFD. We called - they answered; we called - they answered all the way from K1 to K5 to KØ. What a night! Well, the sandman hit and the band kept on and ZLO went sound asleep sitting on a tubetester in front of the repeater xmtr dreaming of the great opening. One other troPo opening occurred this summer. This one made the path from W3ZLO to a 10 watt mobile in downtown Buffalo and back. This same opening, also on a Monday, allowed the famous walkie-talkies of Dunkirk to work .94 simplex with Erie, full quieting.

As you can see, these are just the highlights of activity on 2 FM. Would you like to join in? Here you will find a great bunch of guys who are really proud of their work. Now it is possible for a 2 watt walkie talkie in downtown Erie to work a 2 watt walkie talkie in Ashtabula using 34-76. Plans are continuing to extend this to Dunkirk and make the frequency either 34/94; 34/76; 25/85 or 19/79. You pick the input and output - it will be there. As this is being written, the 250 watts for W3ZLO is being assembled. Also to be added very shortly is the new touch-tone auto patch, the CW ID unit and the voting system.

I would like to thank the supporters of the Erie Repeater for voicing their opinions at the August meeting. It is your support that gets results and creates interest in "The Machine."
