MINUTES

March 2, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 8:30 PM by K3QAY.

Officers present: K3QAY, W3ZLO, WA3HSR, and WA3EAY.

Directors present: K3VLP, K3UPC, W3SN, WA3MAU and WA3HDK.

A round of introductions was held with George Rapp, W3EBY of Philadelphia among the guests.

The minutes of the February meeting were approved as read.

The treasurer indicated a balance of \$161.98. K3UPC moved that all new bills be paid. This motion passed without discussion.

CORRESPONDENCE:

- 1) Several requests for auction information.
- 2) \$15.00 contribution to the repeater from Don Acker,
- 3) Letter from Walt Jordan, W3SLC was read to the members present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

QUA-RAE - Amis the applause and cries of "good issue", Bob, WA3HDK reported on the March issue. He have thanks to all those contributing. Bob also reported that cost per issue has been running close to \$30.00.

CD - W3KPM reported that this years Welfare Test would be on March 28-29 (Friday and Saturday) and that local operations would take place on Friday night. Tom reported that the test would probably be held in Albion.

ACTIVITIES - W3ZLO listed the following upcoming activities: March 16 - 42-V clinic with film and specialists. April 1 - Dunkirk "Ham of the Year" Award. April 6 - Circuit board making program after business meeting. April 8 - RAE auction.

ARRL ASSISTANT DIRECTOR - W3ZLO read a bulletin regarding the

changes in frequency of WIAW transmissions. Chuck also indicated that the ARRL has filed opposition to RM 1747, the 220 MHz CB proposal, and that John Johnson, K3BNS was a new FCC man in Washington.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS - K3UPC indicated that leases between the RAE and Bliley Electric remained to be signed but that the other three regarding the repeater had been signed, John also noted that the RAE insurance covers any official RAE activity anywhere.

REPEATER - It was reported that W3ZLO was the trustee of the new repeater license which was recently applied for. It was also reported that the K8EUR repeater group decided unanimously to suspend the idea of a link with the Erie repeater for the time being and go 16/76. W3ZLO also reported that a blown 4-125A was replaced by W3UCZ.

AUCTION - WA3HDK reported that advertisements had appeared in HAM RADIO so far and that several hundred fliers have been sent to CB clubs upon request. It was then moved that, "Carl McGary be given a QUA-RAE subscription for supplying Auction posters" The motion passed without discussion

OLD BUSINESS

The results of the membership voting was read. Those in favor of the quorum change - 60; those against - 13. 73 ballots were received from the 105 sent out.

A discussion concerning committee financing was then begun. Some disagreement arose as to whether the repeater committee could have their own treasurer or if the RAE treasurer was also the committee's treasurer. An inspection of the November 1970 minutes revealed that the latter was true. K3VLP then moved, "that all committees shall select their

APRIL 8 - Etch it indelibly in your mind! RAE Annual Auction begins promptly at 2 o'clock in the St. George School Gynasium. Doors will open at 12 o'clock to give everyone a chance to look over the "goodies".

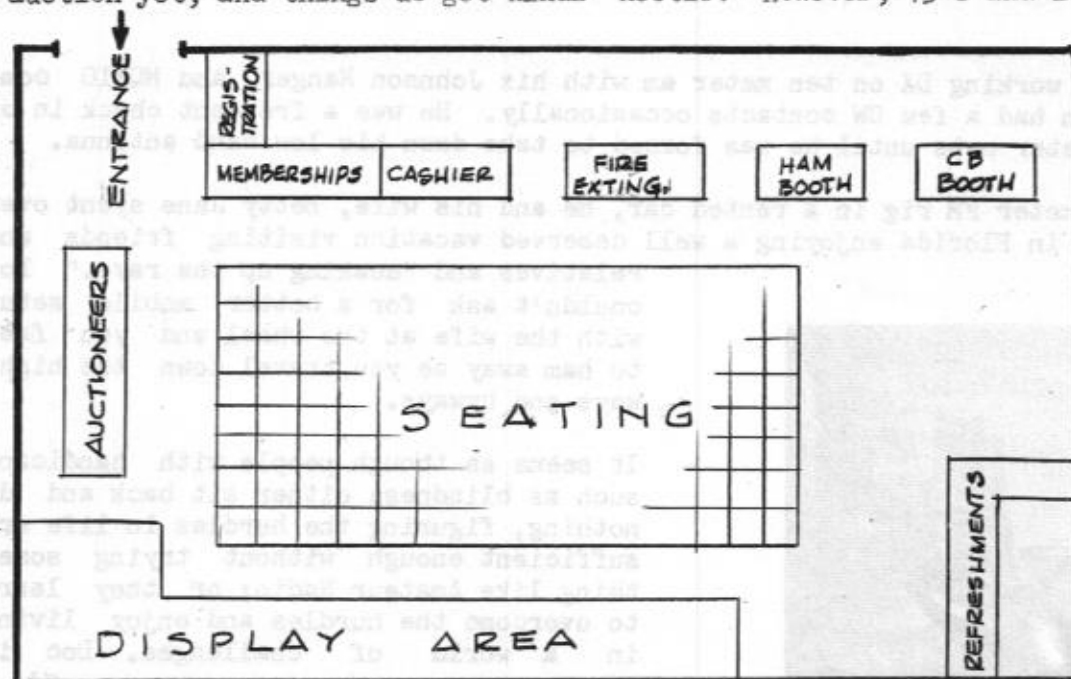
The auction will be run similarly to last year's; but here's the plan in case you've forgotten. You should enter from the parking lot on the southwest side of the building. If you have goods to auction, secure a "ticket" for each item you want to go on the block. This ticket is your receipt and we will not be able to pay you the proceeds without it - so DON'T LOOSE IT! By the way, the ticket will cost you a whopping 10¢. (you loose your dime even if your item is not sold. But that is all you loose because there is no commission on items you buy back.)

We hope this system will discourage those who would have us auction each of a hundred tubes, for example. Instead, we will, if you direct us to do so, auction the first item in the lot, then sell as many of the rest as we can on a first-come basis at the same price.

We encourage you to discard the minimum price bid concept as that limits the psychological tendency toward competitive bidding. We feel that we can run the auction more efficiently and get higher prices if you will let our auctioneer work freely. Instead of minimum bids, then, watch your gear when it comes up for sale. If you done like the price, BID IT BACK. When you bid back your own equipment, there will not be a 10% commission charged to you. Just tell the clerk who delivers it so he can mark your ticket accordingly.

Please stay in the seating area that is provided during the auction. In order to break up the monotony, we will auction goods for 50 minutes, then break for 10. During the 10 minute break, you may purchase refreshments at the snack bar, (We plan to have Hot Dogs, Coffee, Pop, and Donuts.) or visit one of the displays.

We hope we can find the time during the auction to personally greet each of you. I doubt that will be possible, because we will be frantically trying to make this the best auction yet, and things do get kinda' hectic. However, 73's and look for us.

Most Hams would say that obtaining an Amateur Radio license was probably one of the more difficult things they have done in their life. I would be the first to admit that being blind certainly wouldn't make the task any easier. This month we are pleased to salute a man who overcame this hurdle of blindness not only in Amateur Radio but also in medicine. He is Doctor Richard Stancliff, K3AXS, Doctor of Osteopathy and a native Erieite.

He suffered from a hereditary disease in childhood that cruelly cost him his sight. Setting his goals high, he attended Grove City College for undergraduate work in medicine before venturing on and graduating from Philadelphia College of Osteopathy and surgery in 1942. "My practice is backaches, and I truly enjoy my work."

It was the late John Szumigala, W3FVH, who visited Doc and interested him in Amateur Radio. John directed him to the annual RAE code and theory class with Bart Geer at the helm. When "the day" came, Doc packed up his typewriter and went to Buffalo to take the test. He was determined not to take the exam for the conditional by mail because of the possible insinuations of fraud so often attached to holders of conditional licenses.

Doc first started working DX on ten meter am with his Johnson Ranger and HQ110 combination. He even had a few CW contacts occasionally. He was a frequent check in on the six and ten meter nets until he was forced to take down his low band antenna.

With his new two meter FM rig in a rented car, he and his wife, Betty Jane spent over a week this March in Florida enjoying a well deserved vacation visiting friends and relatives and "soaking up the rays." You couldn't ask for a better mobile setup with the wife at the wheel and you free to ham away as you travel down the highways and byways.



It seems as though people with handicaps such as blindness either sit back and do nothing, figuring the hurdles in life are sufficient enough without trying something like Amateur Radio; or they learn to overcome the hurdles and enjoy living in a world of challenges. Doc is

This fifteenth annual test will be held at the Northwestern High School in Albion. The object of this test is to train local citizens of the community in the mass care and handling of people in times of emergency.

Some form of entertainment is always given on Friday evening.

We will again be using RTTY for the R&I information that is sent to Red Cross Headquarters at 150 W 6th Street, Erie, PA. Voice communications will be passed thru the 2 meter repeater link. This will be the first time that the repeater has been used for official county-wide tests. The communications will begin at 6 PM and we usually secure the stations between 11 PM and midnight.

PREZ SEZ

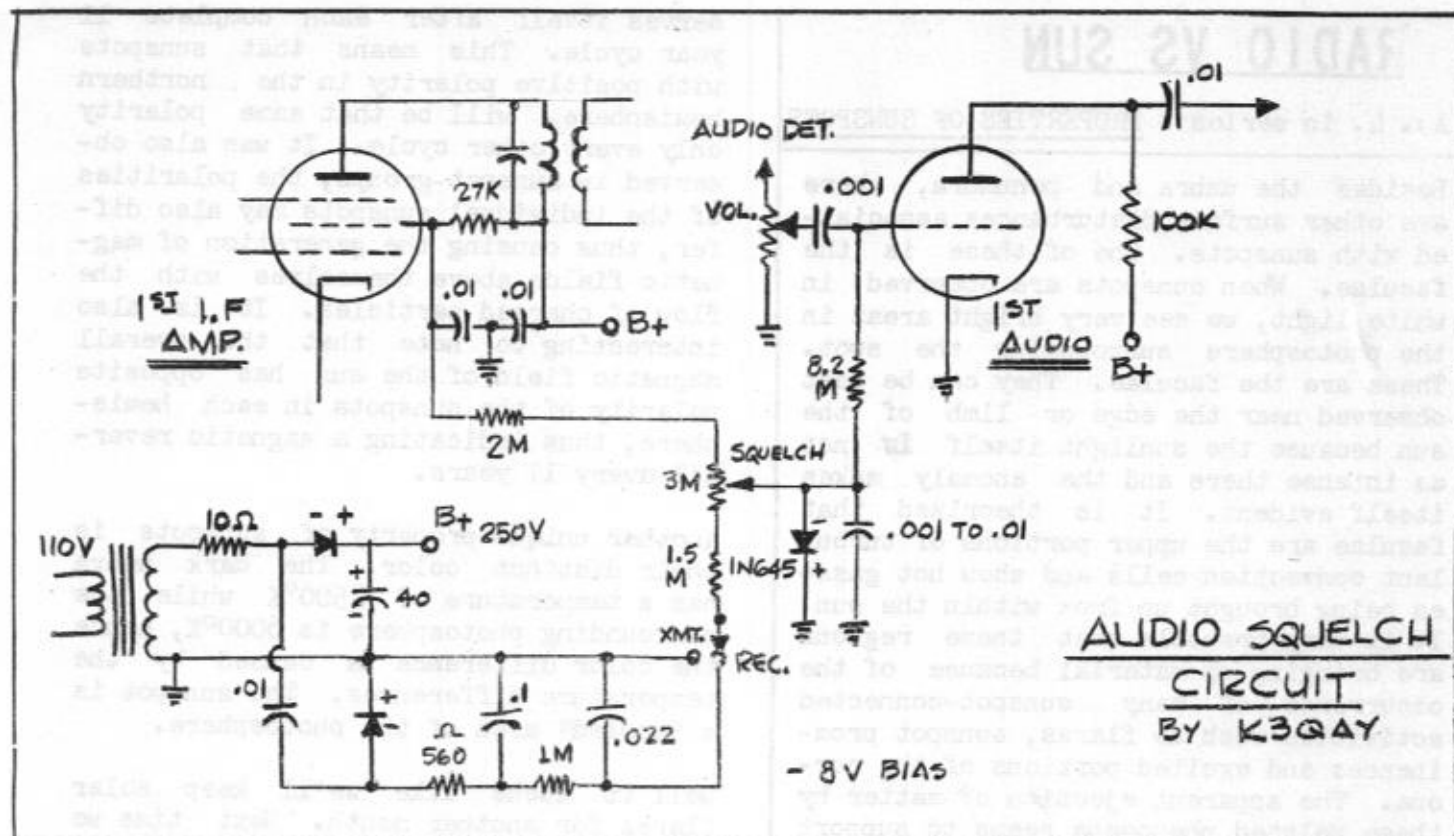

RADIO VS SUN

No. 4. in series - PROPERTIES OF SUNSPOTS

Besides the umbra and penumbra, there are other surface disturbances associated with sunspots. One of these is the faculae. When sunspots are observed in white light, we see very bright areas in the photosphere surrounding the spot. These are the faculae. They can be best observed near the edge or limb of the sun because the sunlight itself is not as intense there and the anomaly makes itself evident. It is theorized that faculae are the upper portions of turbulent convection cells and show hot gasses being brought up from within the sun. It is very probable that these regions are bringing up material because of the occurrence of many sunspot-connected activities such as flares, sunspot prominences and excited portions of the corona. The apparent ejection of matter by these related phenomena seems to support this idea. One can often predict the appearance of a sunspot by finding faculae. The faculae usually precede the sunspots formation and also may continue to glow for varying times after the sunspot decays. Another version of the faculae appear more poleward than we ever find sunspots. It is not uncommon to find this kind of faculae between 60° and 80° latitude. Since sunspots don't occur at this latitude, these faculae exhibit different properties than their lower latitude relatives. These appear as very tiny, bright points and are very short-lived. The polar faculae are most frequent during minimums of sunspot activity.

When the chromosphere (atmosphere) above the sunspot is observed in Hydrogen light, it often shows up as a vortex structure. Because many ions and other charged particles are found in the chromosphere, it was thought that they may generate a magnetic field within the vortex. George Ellery Hale discovered these magnetic fields around sunspots in 1913. Some of Hale's most interesting observations were that sunspots in one hemisphere exhibit the polarity opposite those in the other. This polarity re-

serves itself after each complete 11 year cycle. This means that sunspots with positive polarity in the northern hemisphere, will be that same polarity only every other cycle. It was also observed in sunspot groups, the polarities of the individual sunspots may also differ, thus causing the generation of magnetic fields above themselves with the flow of charged particles. It is also interesting to note that the overall magnetic field of the sun has opposite polarity of the sunspots in each hemisphere, thus indicating a magnetic reversal every 11 years.

Another unique property of sunspots is their distinct color. The dark umbra has a temperature of 4500°K while the surrounding photosphere is 6000°K, hence the color difference is caused by the temperature differences. The sunspot is a "cooled" area of the photosphere.

Well it looks like we'll keep solar flares for another month. Next time we will examine a flare and see what it is and look at the different types. Following this we will look at some simultaneous terrestrial effects of flares and later the delayed effects.

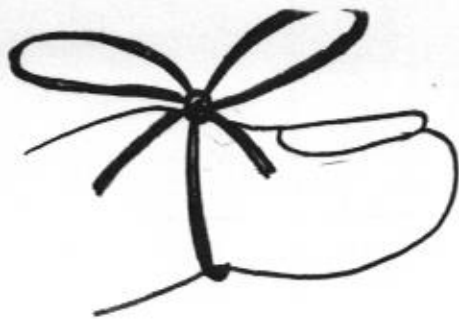
