R.A.E. MINUTES

December 7, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 8:07 PM by K3QAY.
Officers present: K3QAY, WA3HSR, and WA3EAY.
Directors present: WA3HDK, K3VLP, W3SN, WA3MAU, AND WA3KAI.
The minutes of the November meeting were approved.
The treasurer indicated a balance of \$282.40.

Tom Schwab, W3KPM turned over a slip for the deposit of \$185.65 to the RAE account from interest on the bonds. Tom also turned over the safety deposit box key to WA3EAY. Several alternate ways of investment were discussed as the bonds will mature next year. It was agreed that the Board of Directors would discuss the matter at their next meeting. It was also agreed that W3KPM and W3AQY continue to clip the coupons until other arrangements could be made.

K3QAY then declared that a quorum existed and turned the meeting over to the Election Committee consisting of K3VLP, WA3MAU, WA3HSR, and WA3ISN. K3VLP declared nominations for Board of Directors be opened. The two outgoing Directors were WA3HDK and K3UPC. The following members were nominated: WA3HSR, Mike Hall; K3HFL, Bud Wilson; and W3NFM, Dick Conley. After nominations were closed a secret ballot election was held with the following results:

Dick Conley, W3NFM - 9

Bud Wilson, K3HFL - - 8

K3VLP declared that the election was a valid one and the new Board members take their positions immediately. George then turned the meeting over to K3QAY.

After some discussion it was moved by WA3HDK to make payment and the motion was carried. Bob also announced that a QUA-RAE meeting would be held on December 28, 1972 at the Red Cross Building.

ACD - WA3HSR reported for W3KPM that the TR-4 at the EOC was sent back to Drake and the repaired rig had already been received by Civil Defense. The total cost was around \$20.00. Mike also reported that Tom expected to have the COM truck inspected next week. Mike also reported that the Mobile Activities Committee would be installing a 12 volt power system on the COM truck in the near future.

REPEATER- K3WTZ reported that repairs to the transmitter's COR had been completed and that remote control shut-down of the repeater was now possible. Brownie also added that the amplifier and power supplies had been obtained from W3ZLO.

REPEATER COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES--- DECEMBER 14, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 20:00 by K3WTZ

Minutes were read and approved as corrected.

Treasurer not present, report given by K3WTZ.

Balance \$131.56

\$40. has been paid to Bliley Electric for electricity.

\$40. has been paid to Haysite for electricity.

OLD BUSINESS

K3NAU reported Bliley has received check for \$40.

K3TZ reported he has built the tone decoder for the control like of the repeater.

Investigation of moving the XMTR site is nearing completion- and the TIME OUT circuits have been completed. The operation of the RF sensor for the power amplifier was discussed.

The CCR was replaced at the XMTR site by K3WTZ & K3QAY.

K3WTZ reported the new exciter is ready to be given to K3ATZ to finish.

K3QAY reported that he is still working on the power amplifier for the XMTR.

George Dickey donated a chassis for the power supply at the XMTR.

K3WTZ reported that the source of the hum on the repeater has been located- part is in the controller at the XMTR site the other part is in the link XMTR at the RCVR site. Looks like the power supply for link XMTR has bad filters.

Project will be undertaken to build 450 XMTR with tone control to control frequency of XMTR between .79 and .94.

Discussion of how repeater should operate on dual frequency 34/94 and 19/74.

Penelec changed insulator on one pole on the line that runs near the RCVR site. While the high voltage line was shut down the noise in the RCVR was almost completely gone but when line was energized the noise appeared. Discussion followed on what action we could take to correct the problem.

K3WTZ estimated cost would be \$35. for modifications to RCVR to operate 19/79 and 34/94.

K3NAU suggested formation of 2 meter net using the acronym MERET - Metropolitan Erie Radio Emergency Team. Net would meet 34/94 on Sunday night at 8:30.

It was decided to try for awhile to see if interest was there. K3NAU has appointed net manager.

Discussion of dues and voting rights followed - it was agreed upon that to be a

There has been quite a lot of running around and excitement in the air around the Meadville area of late. What is it all about? Would you believe a two meter repeater?

Last year the Meadville club reorganized and gave itself a new name -the Crawford Amateur Radio Society, and established a number of new goals to go along with its new name.

emergency communications in the area, with the thoughts of bad winter storms and floods of the past in the backs of their minds. After a couple of the fellows were on two FM a short time, and hearing and seeing all the activity around on two meter FM repeaters, they came to the conclusion that it was the answer to their communications problems.

Seeking help from their new friends on the WA3KXD repeater they first thought of a satellite KXD receiver site in Meadville. That was fine for rag chewing for base stations, but no good for local mobile communications coverage. The logical conclusion: Meadville should have its' own repeater.

Trying to find suitable equipment for a repeater, at a cheap price, is like looking for a needle in a haystack. Even so, when an offer of some free equipment was servicable but it meant more work than what was planned.

This is where I come in. I had been working on an all transistor AC-DC portable two meter repeater for several months and was nearly finished, but had no where to put it. So at the suggestion of one of the Erie FMers I offered my equipment for lease to the fellows down south to help them get their "machine" on the air a bit sooner with little or no work. I would see the fruits of my labor put to good use, and Meadville would have a chance to learn about repeater construction and installation first hand and do it cheaply!

As it turned out maybe it was cheaper in terms of dollars and cents, but not so in hours. They still have to build a replacement of their own.

I think our friends down South have learned as we did, and do yet, that a repeater is no simple project, but a complicated communications system, with lots of unknowns and frustrations.

being fortunate enough to secure permission to use the county's emergency communication facilities at the Crawford County Fair Ground with its 120' tower was a real inspiration to the group. Bob Myers, K3HWL, CARS President and his repeater Committee chairman Mike Caputo, K3YAK, quickly got things organized to get a couple of antennas installed on the tower 100', 60' levels, for receiving and transmitting respectively.

Hurriedly putting the finishing touches on the "machine" I was in my car and down to Meadville a week or so later. This would be one of many, many trips down to the repeater site for tests and adjustments in the weeks to come. We quickly learned what a headache repeater installation can be and what a difficult problem getting rid of "desensitization" would be.

Initial range of the repeater was about three miles with a one-watt set and around six or seven with a twenty watt unit. Since then through the use of heliax cable, filters, and a preamp on the receiver the range has been extended to about six or eight miles for a one-watt unit and ten to fifteen for twenty watt mobiles. Stations in Erie running ten watts and a beam can be copied through the machine regularly.

With some cavities in the process of being built, the range of the repeater ought to be about ten to fifteen miles for one-watt mobiles and thirty to forty miles for a twenty watt mobile and that will be with twenty watts output from the repeater transmitter itself.

Perhaps this ought to be labeled as a progress report, as the project is really only partially completed. Meadville's own equipment is being systematically gathered, tested and assembled, the licensing legwork has been completed and is now in the hands of good 'ole F.C.C. (for eight weeks at this writing)

I think the most important aspect of the whole project to date is the all goodwill and cooperation that has been generated by the repeater project, not only within the club, but also within the

community and with amateurs in both Crawford and Erie Counties.

If a group of hams of the size of the CARS, can pull off a project of this magnitude they have done something short of stupendous, and at this time it looks as though they just might succeed! More power to them. I'm proud to say I've been a part of this fantastic project which shows the potential that we have if we ever put our minds and hearts to it.

The Erie (RAE) repeater can take pride in it's success and the part it has played in encouraging the Meadville fellows onward, but we have a great natural potential in sheer numbers alone. I think there is a lesson in co-and team effort here which ought to make us up here at the RAE think twice about our club.

I am proud of what we are, but would be even prouder of what we could be. Let's show the fellows in Meadville that their strivings for their club and amateur radio aren't unique to them alone, but are untapped potentials in all clubs and amateurs alike.

MOBILE COMMITTEE

In late November the nucleus of a mobile operating committee met at the Erie County Emergency Operating Center. (E.O.C.) During this first meeting it was decided to start upgrading the equipment in the Communication truck. As a start it was decided to obtain a TU unit for the teletype unit, get an all-band mobile antenna, install a 12-Volt alternator and battery to power the communications equipment. We have received the kit for the TU and are in the process of evaluating various all band antennas. This last item might not seem like much but you must remember, that an antenna that loads well on a car may not work at all on the truck. We are contemplating putting the Viking II back in the truck to be used on RTTY.

This would relieve the Swan of being overworked when transmitting RTTY. For the uninformed, the rule of thumb for operating RTTY with a SSB Transceiver they advise only about 1/3 of the CW power, then in only no more than 10 mins. on -10 min. off. (Which we always exceed on the annual C.D. - R.C. emergency test. At that time we usually xmit for about 40 min. to an hour without a break.) With the Viking II we can use about 180 Watts D.C. continuous.

We also hope to get some better 6 and 10 meter AM gear for both 12 Volt DC and 110 V. A.C. These are only some of the things we are hoping for. Sometime in the near future we want to get a 2 meter transceiver for the com truck. When you stop to think about it, very little has been done by the club in upgrading the club equipment in the past 5 years. For that matter very little has been done by CD at the E. O. C. either.

Also at this meeting we asked about having the hospital net activated for the SET and were told by Tom, K3KPM, the radio officer, that the hospital net could only be activated by Mr. Enis at Hamot Medical Center. He also wondered how they kept getting certified when the net hasn't been activated for 2 years. We are hoping to find out who all the stations are which have any mobile capabilities on any band so that a roster can be made up. Stop for a moment and think of all the true emergencies that have been in the past year- Rapid City Flood, Eastern Pennsylvania Flood in June, and the Nicaraguan earthquake to mention the better known ones-where Ham Radio made the difference of having contact with the rest of the world or not. Those of you who helped out or even monitored these events know that almost every station on the air the first hours or so signed "MOBILE."

This should be considered when you are resting your fat south side in a warm, well lighted ham shack and some mobile station cones on freq. driving on a rough road or through rush hour traffic slightly off freq. I've even noticed

xtra controlled mobile gear shift freq. when the voltage regulator shifted from 12-13 volts to 15-16 volts. In most mobiles remember that the 2 to 3 volt increase is multiplied by about 20 times making it come out to be a 40-60 volt change at plates of the rig. Usually only the VFO has a voltage regulating tube.

By next month we hope to be able to tell you what has been done, not what is planned.

This is no accident or black magic that our multi site repeater performs its many functions accurately and reliably, but instead is the result of many many hours of effort and the many dollars contributed by various persons—not even hams—and by the repeater committee members themselves.
