MINUTES OF JULY RAE MEETING

The meeting was called to order at 7:36 pm by Chester Kanis, KB3P. The roll call of officers and board members found all members present except KA3JTD.

A moment of silence was observed in memory of Dick Conley, W3NFM, who became a silent key.

The minutes of the June meeting were approved as recorded in the QUA-RAE. The Treasurers report was given by Bob, N3FAW, and approved as read. Bob then made a motion, which was seconded by Joe, K3IVG, that the RAE purchase a good quality brass key, have it mounted on a wooden base, engraved on memory of Dick Conley, and made available for loan by the membership. The motion passed by oral vote. Bob next suggested the membership consider raising the yearly dues enough to offset the annual operating expenses of the club rather than always spending all the interest earned on the grant money for operating expenses, thus allowing this interest to be banked in a "rainy-day" fund. Bob estimated the required increase to be around three to six dollars per year. A discussion followed.

Board of Directors Report was given by Joe, K3IVG. There was not a quorum at the meeting held on June 26 due to Field Day. Various things were discussed, but no action was possible.

Field Day - Joe, KC3LV, reported that approximately twelve operators showed up at the W3GV site, making roughly 836 CW, 551 SSB and 4 packet contacts worth about 4850 points. Special thanks to KJ3L and KB3A. Property chairman to store generators. Joe, K3IVG, reported that his Field Day site was in the shade and therefore cool and that a good time was had by all. Jack, K3TJM, reported he had six operators, operated Class 3A and his group had fun also.

Grant Committee - Bob N3FAW, worked with Tom Bochler (of the Red Cross), and Tony, WB3KGT, on a rough draft of a presentation of various ideas in their search for funds. Bob made his presentation to The First National Bank of PA and a donation is coming. Thanks to our Grant Committee and 'The first.'

Membership - Jim, KJ3L, stated that there are presently 192 paid members.

Skywarn/Public Service - Joe, K3IVG, listed coming events: 7/09/88, St. V. Triathlon at Elk Vally at 4 pm; 7/17/88, one-half marathon at Peninsula at 7:30 am; 7/23/88, St V. Quad bike race at Albion at 2 pm (big event).

Picnic '88 - Chester, KB3P, has the date, 7/23/88, but says he needs volunteers.

Club Directory - Jack, K3TJM, reported that the printer messed up a couple of pages and that the price has increased dramatically. Joe, K3IVG, is to work with Jack on perhaps a less expensive directory for this year. Education - Dick, KA3KFQ, will help a new education chairman get started and is willing to assist any way he can. RAE VE Team - Norma, W3CG, reported that W3CG, KY3D, KA3GXP, NI3Q, NO3E and W8HVK conducted the July exams and the next exam is August 6, 1988, at Villa Maria at 8 am. Norma also reported that Cliff, VE3ANN, is recuperating from an attack he suffered last week.

OLD BUSINESS; K3IVG has a list of equipment for sale from the shack of Dick, W3NFM. Call Joe at 866-5121 for details any time after 7:00 pm. N3GCN read some information he received on ARRL Special Service Clubs. He is enthusiastic and thinks the RAE should qualify easily. He will bring details to the next Board of Directors meeting. KB3A reports that the club jackets are in and moved that he be reimbursed approximately \$96.00, to be replaced after all jackets are delivered. Seconded by K3IVG. Passed by oral vote. K3IVG needs ground crew volunteers for the 22/82 antenna raising Sunday 7/10/88 at 12:30 pm. The antennas were rebuilt and resealed and are ready to fly again. I should state that not all Erie amateurs have been this way. In fact, most have been very helpful. But it's the few "bad apples" that always spoil the barrel.

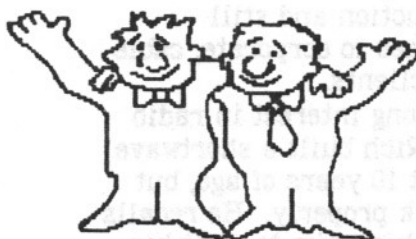

MOVING-UP

Rich Gensheimer, N3GCP, was born and reared in Erie, attended Cathedral Prep and earned a degree in Marketing from Mercyhurst College. He and xyl Marcia have 2 daughters, Emily 7 and Beth, 3.

Working in the advertising and corporate communications field for 13 years, for the past 7 years, Rich has owned his own firm, Parrot Productions. The firm provides video production, audio-visual production and still photography services to corporate, cable TV and editorial clients.

Having a life long interest in radio communications, Rich built a shortwave radio from a kit at 10 years of age, but never got it to work properly. He recalls his grandfather taking him to visit his friend Walt Jordan, W3SLC, at 28th and Holland, and Walt included him in a QSO with a west coast operator, which impressed him no end.

Rich attended the Navy's communications technician "A" school in Pensacola, Fla. in 1972, earning his Novice call, WN3TUZ with the help of the guys at the base A. Radio Club, WA4ECY. While there, an operator named George Dean used to run Sunday evening phone patches to Erie with Chuch Bliley, K3NAU. Once back in Erie and back to college, Rich never did manage to get a station on the air.

He always maintained his interest in radio and has never been without a shortwave receiver of one sort or another. This spring he decided to invest the time, earn a ticket and put a station on the air. On March 5, he passed Novice and Technician in Erie, and the following day at the Conneaut Hamfest, passed 3B, General Theory. Again in Erie on April 2, he passed 1B, the General Code and 4A, Advanced. Going from SWL to Advanced in less than a month is surely an inspiration to others. He hopes to find time to go for A. Extra when the snow flies again.

Rich bought an ICOM 745 at the Indiana Hamfest and rigged up an indoor four element dipole for 10-15-20-40 meters. His first contact was a ham in Orange Co., Cal. and second, a mobile op on 25 states, 20 countries in Europe, Central and South America, Africa, and a number of Special Event Stations. Eventually, plans call for a 2 meter rig for mobile use when travelling on TV and Photo assignments.

Rich is currently homebrewing an IC keyer from QST and is looking for an antenna tuner. He is also looking for a

preamp circuit which will allow him to use a Sennheiser 421 broadcast microphone with his IC745.

Rich says he is having lots of fun with A. Radio despite the limited time he is able to devote to it. He has had the opportunity to meet a fair number of hams in his travels and is always impressed with their hospitality and looks forward to being involved with this hoppy for many years.

Rich, N3GCP, credits the volunteer examiners for making it easy for those interested in obtaining a license and feels the present system is a big improvement over the old FCC Exam system. -Norma Vanderhoff, W3CG

A SPECIAL EVENT STATION

The Cathedral Preparatory Amateur Radio Association (CPARA) will sponsor a special event station, which will operate from the Perry Street station of the Oil Creek & Titusville Railroad. The station, using the call sign N3GCN, will operate from 1400Z to 2130Z on both September 3 and 4, 1988. The station commemorates the third consecutive year of operation of the highly popular tourist railroad. Look for N3GCN on the lower 25Khz of the Novice CW subbands, as well as on the lower 25 Khz of the General SSB subbands on 80, 40, 20 and 15 Meters. It is planned to operate on SSB on the Novice frequency of 28.350 Mhz. There will be some two meter FM operation on 147.21 Mhz (+600), and 145.23 Mhz (-600), from the moving train.

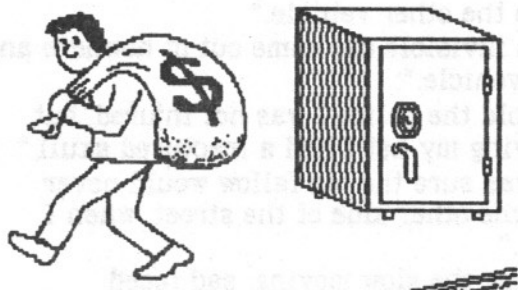

OL' MONEY BAG'S COLUMN

Not long ago in this eminent publication I wrote that our dues should be enough to carry the club through its normal yearly expenses. We fall short of that by about \$1,000, which is the amount of the dividend from the Treasury bonds. We are currently using the Bliley grant money as a personal charity to save each of us from paying our proper dues to support our club!

At the June meeting I was asked to determine how much of a dues increase would be required to compensate for that \$1,000. At the July meeting I advised that with 160 regular annual dues paying members we would need \$6 yearly increase. This amount would enable us to save about \$960 per year. This money could be available for unforeseen problems or expenses, or the membership could vote to use it for any purpose. However, with our present dues at only \$9 I believe the increase to \$15 could be too great a strain for many members. I see newsletters from many other clubs and most of them are paying dues of \$15 or more!

I do not wish to chase anyone away, therefore at the September meeting I intend to place a motion to increase our yearly dues by \$3 beginning with 1989. Contrary to some of the comments I have overheard, I have no ulterior motive to spend the money on the repeaters.

Fact is, we need more members. There are many Hams in the Erie Area who are not members; you may have a friend who is not a member. Why not urge him/her to attend meetings and join? Everyone should be considered to be a member of the membership committee. If each of us recruited a member we would double our membership, and we would then find that our present dues would be more adequate!

I believe the RAE is a worthwhile Club, recognized by many in our community as such, and much appreciated by the groups for whom we provide public service.

Any organization without enough money is weak. Can we afford not to be strong? Submitted by Bob Schwimmer, N3FAW.

11. "Had been driving my car for forty years when I fell asleep at the wheel and had an accident."
12. "I was on my way to the Doctor's with rear end trouble when my universal joint gave way, causing me to have an accident."
13. "As I approached the intersection, a stop sign suddenly appeared in a place where no stop sign had ever appeared before. I was unable to stop in time to avoid an accident."
14. To avoid hitting the bumper of the car in front, I struck a pedestrian."
15. "My car was legally parked as it



backed into the other vehicle."

16. "An invisible car came out of nowhere and struck my vehicle."

17. "I told the police I was not injured, but upon removing my hat I had a fractured skull."

18. "I was sure the old fellow would never make it to the other side of the street, when I struck him."

19. "I saw the slow moving, sad faced gentleman as he bounced off the hood of my car."

20. "The indirect cause of this accident, was a little guy in a small car, with a big mouth!"

21. "I was thrown from my car as it left the road. I was later found in a ditch, by some stray cows."

22. "The telephone pole was approaching fast. I attempted to swerve out of it's way when I saw it strike the front of my car."

PEP. MAINE INTRODUCES LEGISLATION

State Rep. Connie Maine has introduced legislation which would provide a special vehicle registration plate for Amateur Radio Operators.

Under the legislation (House Bill 2543) the state Department of Transportation (PennDOT) would issue a special plate to Amateur Radio Operators who apply for one. Plates bearing the words "Amateur Radio Operator" and the operator's call sign would be used as the registration number, she said.

The bill is now being considered by The House Rules Committee.

Maine said the legislation is the result of a letter she received from Robert C. Huson of Meadville, the Western Pennsylvania state

government liason for The American Radio Relay League, asking for legislative action to provide the special plates.

"Amateur Radio Operators play an important role in our communications system, particularly during emergencies such as the tornados that Northwestern Pennsylvania has experienced. The very least we can do to help them perform their duties and to show our appreciation is to give them the chance to obtain the special plates. I appreciate Mr. Huson's efforts in pursuing this matter," Maine concluded.
